# **ACHIEVEMENT REPORT**

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**Approved by 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council**

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
## Introduction

With the aim to build a solidary, self-help, and innovative student community in PSPS, the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council actively performed its duties from March 21 to November 12, 2018. During its tenure, the Student Council successfully implemented 17 major activities under 6 categories as set out in its General Action Plan, initiated/supported 6 related activities, and properly took care of students' claims and various needs. It enabled students to live a worry-free life inside and outside PSPS by providing various life and academic assistance programs, enhance students' physical strength and cultural experience in Korea through a bunch of outdoor activities and cultural events, improve students' environmental awareness through diverse campaigns, and greatly strengthened communications within student community and between student body and PSPS administration. This Achievement Report outlines the major achievements and performance of the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council.

## 1. The Student Council

### 1.1 Establishment of 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council

The PSPS Student Council Presidential Election Committee announced application for candidates of 2018 Student Council's Presidential position on March 6, 2018. Two candidates, Peng Ning (Tracy) from Environmental Management and Policy Major and Mabuda Elliot from Public Policy and Leadership Major competed for the position of PSPS Student Council President. Presidential Election for 2018 Spring and Summer Semester was held on March 13 – 19, 2018. After 2 rounds of debate and the final voting, Peng Ning (Tracy) won the presidential election (Figure 1-1) and assumed the position of the Student Council President for the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester.



**Figure 1-1: Result of Presidential Election for 2018 Spring & Summer Semester**


The Student Council (SC) for the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester was established right after the presidential election. On March 21, 2018, the final name list for Student Council members was released, as follows:

- **Batch Representative** Khanal Santosh (Santosh) from Forest Resources and Ecological Restoration Major (2018);
- **Batch Representative** Aung Naing Soe (Soe) from Environmental Management and Policy Major (2017);
- **Batch Representative** Chelda Lotfi (Lotfi) from Forest Resources and Ecological Restoration Major (2017); and
- **Batch Representative** Cubos Anna Francesca (Anna) on behalf of the whole 4<sup>th</sup> Semester at the time of 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council establishment (2016).

## 1.2 Organization Chart of 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council

The 2018 Spring and Summer Semester Student Council consists of 11 members, including one president, four officers (one vice president, one secretary, one treasurer, and one auditor), and six batch representatives from four majors and three semesters, as shown in Figure 1-2.

## **1.3 Operational Progress**

### **1.3.1 Regular Meetings**

The Student Council holds its regular meetings on a weekly basis to discuss important issues related to student needs and welfare, activity implementation, and Student Council operation. In 2018 Spring and Summer Semesters, the Student Council had **21 Regular Meetings** in total, with topics ranging from student claims and comments, design and implementation of major activities, financial management, to various important issues such as emergency response, etc. The regular meetings timely addressed problems that are closely pertinent to students' daily life and academic performance, efficiently tracked the progress and development of each activity, and facilitated smooth communications between Student Body and the Student Council.

### **1.3.2 Management Procedures**

To systemize its operations, further strengthen transparency and public participation, as well as prepare for latent emergencies, the Student Council has developed **3 management procedures**, including the procedures for the Student Body to observe Student Council's regular meetings, Volunteer Management Procedures, and Emergency Response Procedures. All the procedures are now in use, particularly those on emergency response which effectively helped a number of students in medical need.

### **1.3.3 General Action Plan, Project Proposals and Implementation Plans**

Based on public consultation results, the Student Council has finalized its **General Action Plan** for the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester in April and developed **9 project proposals** for the priority programs of the Spring Semester, which included "Bring Your Own Bottle" (BYOB) Campaign, World Environment Day (WED) Celebration, "Life Orientation Program – Mentor Guidelines", Student Flea Market, T-shirt for PSPS Students, Study Groups, Academic Salon, Sports Match, and Cultural Festival. It updated the General Action Plan in July in accordance with progress in Spring Semester, new developments from the PSPS Office, and results from a second public consultation to better address students' needs and feasibility issues. **4 additional project proposals** were prepared accordingly to plan Daegu Tour, Cultural Festival, Chuseok Festival, and Saemaul Unity Day.

The project proposals outlined the major tasks and specific steps for each priority activity, and served as the basis for implementation. For complicated activities, detailed implementation plans were used. **4 implementation plans** were developed for World Environment Day (WED) Celebration, Sports Match, Cultural Festival, and Chuseok Festival respectively.

### **1.3.4 Organization of Presidential Election for 2018 Fall Semester**

A Presidential Election Committee was established in October to prepare Presidential Election for the Fall Semester. Headed by the Vice President of Spring and Summer Semester Student Council as the Returning Officer, the Committee consists of one Deputy Returning Officer, one Election Administrator, and 4 Members, with well-balanced gender composition and adequate representativeness of continent. Detailed Presidential Election Regulations and corresponding Guidelines were developed and released to guide eligible and interested candidates.

Application was open to all PSPS students who paid Student Council fee from October 29 to November 2, 2018. By the end of application closure, only one candidate Paulyn Alexis Dela Reyna (Piao) submitted the Letter of Intent. After all procedures for qualification examination, the Election Committee announced Piao as the Sole Candidate.

The Presidential Campaign was on November 3 – 11, during which 2 presidential debates were organized. The first debate on November 5 was for the Candidate to present her qualification, vision, and preliminary plan; while and second debate on November 7 was a Q&A session in which the candidate randomly selected 5 questions from a bunch of questions prepared by the Election Committee and answered them on spot. The voting and counting of ballots was held on November 12, 2018 to allow for proper completion of all the remaining activities of the existing Student Council, the delay of which are primarily caused by external factors such as change of Yeungnam University venue reservation schedule that affected the date of Student Council's last important activity of Cultural Festival. 61 students out of 65 PSPS students voted, equivalent to 93.8%. There were 56 "YES" votes, accounting for 91.8% of the total population who voted; 4 "NO" votes, equivalent to 6.5%; and 1 "SPOILT vote, equivalent to 1.7%. Paulyn Alexis Dela Reyna won as the PSPS Student Council President of 2018 Fall Semester.

## 2. Major Programs and Activities

### 2.1 General Action Plan

#### 2.1.1 Overview

First and foremost, the Student Council drafted a General Action Plan for the 2018 Spring and Summer Semester as the framework for all programs and activities in the 2 semesters in March. The 1<sup>st</sup> Student General Assembly (SGA) in 2018 was organized on April 2, 2018 for public consultation. Copies of draft General Action Plan were distributed among students from all majors and semesters after the SGA for written comments. Based on thorough consultation and discussions, the General Action Plan was finalized (Annex 1), signed by the entire Student Council, and posted on PSPS Superclub page and PSPS website for publicity. Signed copies were circulated among all majors and semesters for students' references.

With the purposes to practice Saemaul Spirit, encourage solidarity and cooperation, strengthen communications, develop a self-help student community, and create an environment-friendly PSPS, the final General Action Plan consists of **6 categories of programs and 17 associated activities**, covering major areas of students' social and academic life in Korea. The 6 program categories include: Information Channel and Public Participation (with 2 activities), Awareness Campaigns (with 4 campaigns), Life Support Program (with 4 program/activities), Academic Assistance and Knowledge Sharing Program (with 3 activities), Cultural Festival (with one festival), as well as Outdoor Activities (with 3 activities).

Among the 17 activities, **8 activities are long-term activities** that will be operated throughout the spring and summer semesters (including 1.1 Information Channel, 1.2 Volunteering System, 2.1 BYOB Campaign, 2.2 PSPS Promotional Campaign, 2.3 Networking Campaign, 3.2 Life Orientation Program, 4.1 Study Groups, and 4.2 Academic Salon) and **9 short-term activities** to be conducted once during the two semesters (including 2.4 WED Celebration, 3.1 Campus Tour in Spring, 3.3 Student Flea Market, 3.4 T-shirt for PSPS Students, 4.3 Research Paper Contest, 5.1 Cultural Festival, 6.1 Sport Match, 6.2 Site-seeing in Daegu, and 6.3 Beach Tour). The combination of long-term and short-term activities is expected to maintain consistency of such strategies as transparency and public participation, and at the same time give more diverse experience for the students to experience during the spring and summer time.

#### 2.1.2 Revision and Updates


In 2018 Spring Semester, 6 long-term activities have been launched and under implementation (including 1.1 Information Channel, 1.2 Volunteering System, 2.1 BYOB Campaign, 2.2 PSPS Promotional Campaign, 3.2 Life Orientation Program, and 4.1 Study Groups), accounting for 75% of the long-term activities, while 3 short-term activities completed (including 2.4 WED Celebration, 3.1 Campus Tour in Spring, and 6.1 Sport Match), accounting for 33% of the short-

term activities. Based on the progress, Student Council evaluated the implementation feasibility of remaining programs, considered new developments from the PSPS Office, and updated the General Action Plan in July. The 2<sup>nd</sup> SGA was held in July 2, 2018 to brief the updates, with copies of revised draft distributed among all majors and semesters for comments. The updated General Action Plan for the Summer Semester was finalized (Annex 2) after public consultation, signed by the Student Council, and released on PSPS Superclub page and PSPS website.


In the updated General Action Plan, changes were made merely to short-term activities building on information from the PSPS Office and decisions from the Faculty. Activity 4.3 “Research Paper Contest” would be merged with the Saemaul Action Plan Contest organized by the PSPS Office in Fall Semester to avoid duplication; an Activity 5.2 “Chuseok Festival” was added to support the PSPS Office to organize the conventional event on Korean Chuseok Festival; and Activity 6.3 “Beach Tour” was replaced by “Excursion: Sangju City Tour” due to feasibility reasons. All the modified activities were implemented in collaboration with the PSPS Office. Meanwhile, Activity 3.3 “Student Flea Market” was held during Activity 5.1 “Cultural Festival” to reduce cost and create synergy.

## 2.2 Implementation of the General Action Plan


By the end of October 2018, all the 8 long-term activities have been under implementation with positive progress, and 7 short-term activities completed (including 2.4 WED Celebration, 3.1 Campus Tour in Spring, 3.4 T-shirt for PSPS Students, 5.2 Chuseok Festival, 6.1 Sport Match, 6.2 Site-seeing in Daegu, and 6.3 Sangju City Excursion). The short-term Activity 5.1 and Activity 3.3 originally planned on October 19 has to be rescheduled and executed on November 9, 2018 to accommodate changes caused by venue reservation conflict in Yeungnam University. As of November 11, 2018, all the activities in the General Action Plan have been carried out successfully. The total activity **implementation rate reaches 100%** (Figure 2-1, Figure 2-2, and Figure 2-3).

## 2.3 Other Activities

### 2.3.1 Global Citizenship Education Program for Elementary School Students

In order to improve PSPS students' country visibility and foster young global citizens in Korea, the Student Council facilitated PSPS students' participation in the Global Citizenship Education Program for Elementary School Students sponsored by KOIKA and DSSID.

On May 4, 2018, 23 PSPS students from 14 countries (including 22 presenters and 1 volunteer photographer) visited the Gyeongsan Seobu Elementary School with 22 Korean undergraduate counterparts. The PSPS students made presentations on their country's culture in 11 classes respectively and played their national/traditional games with the elementary school students. The program was well received by the elementary school. A selected number of PSPS students were further invited to give presentations to undergraduate students in YU.

### 2.3.2 News Articles for the Yeungnam Observer

To foster better understanding of PSPS among YU students and faculties, the Student Council prepared 2 articles for YU's English newspaper *the Yeungnam Observer* under the guidance of Prof. Choi Oe-Chool, President of Global Saemaul Development Network (GSDN) and Prof. Lee Jeongju. The first article titled "Saemaul Spirit Monthly Campaign: First Step toward a Safer and Happier World" by Peng Ning was published on June 4, 2018 to introduce PSPS's Saemaul Spirit Monthly Campaign.

### 2.3.3 2018 Summer Commencement

The 2018 Summer Commencement was held on August 22, 2018 for all the graduating students from 2016 batch. The Student Council supported PSPS Office to organize the commencement ceremony. The Student Council President delivered a congratulatory speech at the ceremony.

### 2.3.4 Saemaul Unity Day

A Saemaul Unity Day event was held on September 12, 2018 in Saemaul Lounge to create a closer bond in PSPS Community and give students chance to enjoy during the summer vacation. Themed with “Live life the Saemaul Way”, the event consisted of 3 games which were specially created to promote the core values of Saemaul Spirits of diligence, self-help and cooperation, a snack session, and a movie session. 30 students participated the event to practice Saemaul way of life and had great fun with their classmates.

### 2.3.5 Donation for Indonesian Disaster Relief

Indonesia’s Sulawesi Island was hit by a powerful magnitude-7.5 earthquake on September 28, 2018, which triggered tsunami waves as high as 6 meters that slammed into Sulawesi at 800 km/h. The death toll from the disaster has risen to 1,649 till October 6; over 70,000 homes were destroyed or damaged; and more than 600,000 children have been affected. Guided by Prof. Choi Oe-Chool, the Student Council initiated a donation in PSPS for Indonesia’s earthquake and tsunami relief. By the end of October 2018, a total amount of KRW 390,000 was collected from students, including KRW 132,000 from 2017 batch, KRW 168,000 from 2018 batch, and KRW 90,000 from the Rwandan Community. PSPS Faculty and the Administration Office also gave their donation to the Student Council, including *inter alia* KWR 100,000 from Prof. Choi Oe-Chool, KWR 110,500 from Prof. Kim Kisu, and USD 100 from the Administration Office. With the income and random donation from the Flea Market, **a total of KWR 825,760** was raised. The money will be combined with the donation raised by DSSID and transferred to the Indonesian Embassy in Korea in the name of Yeungnam University for the disaster relief.

### 2.3.6 Campaign for Inspiring Global Citizenship

To promote understanding of international development cooperation and give more exposure to PSPS students’ countries and cultures, the Student Council supported PSPS participation in the Campaign for Inspiring Global Citizenship funded by KOIKA and DSSID. The campaign consisted of three activities: Campus Cleaning, Global Food Tasting, and Saemaul International Development Exhibition.

On November 9, 2018, over 60 PSPS students from 25 countries joined the Campus Cleaning with Korean undergraduate students to demonstrate Saemaul Spirit. PSPS students prepared traditional food from Asia and Africa (e.g. Afghanistan, Cambodia, Indonesia, Myanmar, Nepal, Philippines, Timor-Leste, Viet Nam, Ethiopia, Ghana, Rwanda, Tanzania, Zambia, etc.). The global food tasting attracted not only students but also visitors to Yeungnam University, greatly enhancing PSPS visibility.

## 2.4 Student Claims

The Student Council opened various channels to listen to students’ complaints and address their needs. During the 5<sup>th</sup> SC Regular Meeting on April 26, both officers and representatives of 2018 batch brought up complaint from students about a male Korean Language teacher’s improper attitude and behavior in class. Private conversations were then carried out individually by SC members with the claimers for further information.


On May 4, SC President, Secretary, and one 2018 Batch Representative held a meeting in PSPS Building Room 402 with 4 voluntary students from the class in question to consult their opinions and confirm the complaints. After the meeting, based on the consultation results, an official complaint document was developed and submitted to the PSPS Office on May 8, with stated facts and suggested solutions. The Office took it seriously, and guaranteed the Student Council that (1) the Office will talk to the Korean Language Institute and make sure the teacher being complained will not teach PSPS students in the new semester, and (2) the students should

give their opinions on this issue during the course evaluation. The Student Council conveyed the Office's messages to the claimer representative on May 9. In addition, special Korean study sessions were arranged for students from the class in question to help them improve their language capacity.


## 2.5 2018 Spring Semester Feedback Survey

Right after the end of Spring Semester, a 2018 Spring Semester Feedback Survey Questionnaire was developed and posted on Superclub page on June 22, 2018 to seek students' opinions and comments on major activities in 2018 Spring Semester provided by the Student Council. The survey link was at the same time shared by all Batch Representatives among their classmates.


By the end of June (June 30, 2018), 27 responses were collected. Among all the respondents, 63% of them believed the SC activities are helpful and 25.9% regarded the activities as "Very helpful" (Figure 2-4); 33.3% are satisfied while 25.9% are very satisfied with the SC activities (Figure 2-5). Moreover, 92.6% would like to participate more actively in the SC programs and activities in Summer Semester (Figure 2-6).
